### CASE FOR HEARING/CAUSE DEVANT ÊTRE ENTENDUE

IN THE MATTER of a complaint filed by Richard Warman, dated February 5, 2002, pursuant to section 13, subsection 1 of the Canadian Human Rights Act against Alexan Kulbashian, James Scott Richardson, Tri-CitySkins.com, Canadian Ethnic Cleansing Team and AffordableSpace.com. The complainant alleges that the respondents have engaged in a discriminatory practice on the grounds of religion, race and national and ethnic origin in the matter related to the usage of a telecommunication undertaking.

2	Upon commencing teleconference on Tuesday,
3	November 16, 2004, at 3:05 p.m.
4	THE CHAIRPERSON: Are we ready to
5	proceed?
6	MS MAILLET: And just for the record,
7	Valerie Phillips is also here.
8	THE CHAIRPERSON: That's right. The
9	usual team is here.
10	So, Mr. Kulbashian, have you had the
11	opportunity to review your material and do you have
12	anything you would like advise us on?
13	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Well,
14	basically, my dad did most of the work on that last
15	night while I was preparing for school, however I did
16	e-mail Mr. Levac about the fact that we're just
17	basically to be going over just clarifying a few issues
18	and it shouldn't be more than an hour.
19	THE CHAIRPERSON: One hour. Okay.
20	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Yeah, roughly
21	about that, yes. It's not going to be like we cut
22	out quite a bit, so
23	THE CHAIRPERSON: Okay, great.
24	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN:there's no
25	repetition or anything like that.

1	THE CHAIRPERSON: Do you want to give
2	me some idea of some of the areas you wanted to go into
3	for any issues of relevance.
4	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Okay.
5	Basically, issues of rele see, because that was
6	actually one thing I was going to ask you about, issue
7	of relevance, because she did state that in some of the
8	cases identification of certain individuals that she
9	commented on were made by information in the media and
10	information in some other books that she doesn't
11	remember entirely and
12	THE CHAIRPERSON: Maybe you should
13	slow down. Hold on.
14	MR. KULBASHIAN: Oh, sorry.
15	THE CHAIRPERSON: I think you should
16	slow down.
17	Okay. So, identification of certain
18	individuals in the media.
19	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Individuals.
20	She had stated that were like, for example,
21	Mr. Fromm and, you know, like, Dr. Pierce, et cetera,
22	were from things that she had heard from, either like,
23	you know she had seen in the media or from books.
24	And I was just going to clear up a
25	quick media issue.

1	THE CHAIRPERSON: I'll broadly call
2	that sources, then.
3	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Excuse me?
4	THE CHAIRPERSON: Sources of her
5	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Oh yeah,
6	exactly. And I was going to clear up there that issue
7	by maybe making her read two paragraphs from three
8	like, two paragraphs altogether from three articles,
9	which will be really brief.
10	THE CHAIRPERSON: I understand. I
11	don't want you to go into too much detail. I don't
12	want you to divulge your entire cross-examination.
13	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Okay, okay.
14	THE CHAIRPERSON: I just wanted the
15	broad strokes of what topics you're dealing with. I'm
16	trying to limit the relevance issues that may
17	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Okay, I
18	understand.
19	And, other than that actually that
20	there, my dad would have done most of the stuff this
21	morning, so if he could just join in briefly and give
22	you some information, because I was at school this
23	morning, so
24	THE CHAIRPERSON: Mr. Kulbashian,
25	Sr.?

1	MR. VAHE KULBASHIAN: I mean, I think
2	the first
3	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Talk about
4	the other points, the other points for Dr. Henry which
5	I was going to get into, pretty much it was from my
6	knowledge clarification.
7	MR. VAHE KULBASHIAN: There is
8	nothing here. I think that it's going to be very
9	short.
10	THE CHAIRPERSON: Okay then. You
11	know what, I don't think we need to explore it further
12	If I have your comments here, your
13	undertakings even - if I can use the term - that it
14	won't be very long, then I don't think we need to get
15	into too much detail.
16	I'm somewhat hesitant here to have
17	you disclose your cross-examination, so
18	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Okay.
19	MR. VAHE KULBASHIAN: We should do
20	our best to finish it tomorrow at least tomorrow, I
21	think.
22	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Well, like,
23	about an hour or two, like, basically.
24	THE CHAIRPERSON: Okay. So then
25	that's fine, that's fine. We have until 5:00, but

1	let's try to hit that target in case we have any other
2	issues afterwards.
3	Now, what does that mean for the
4	remaining days now? Does that mean you think you're
5	available for your evidence beginning Thursday?
6	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Actually, if
7	Mr. Richardson could reply on that issue first, that
8	would be good.
9	MR. RICHARDSON: Yeah. We've chosen
10	not to testify, and I think we should actually start in
11	to making arrangements to do the closings and
12	THE CHAIRPERSON: So, neither you,
13	Mr. Richardson, nor you, Mr. Kulbashian, will be
14	testifying?
15	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: I don't think
16	I'll be testifying either. At this point we made the
17	decision not to testify and I believe that that's going
18	to be pretty much you know, I don't the situation
19	will change after asking a few questions ourselves,
20	so
21	THE CHAIRPERSON: Okay. So, that
22	means so, we should turn our minds then to
23	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: I mean, if
24	the Commission and complainant are done tomorrow, then
25	we should be done tomorrow with all the witnesses then.

1	THE CHAIRPERSON: Unless the
2	Commission or the complainant wish to
3	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: What I mean,
4	like, basically, like they may have up to two hours, if
5	they're done tomorrow with their expert witness.
6	THE CHAIRPERSON: Right, of course.
7	There's
8	MS MAILLET: But the
9	re-examination
LO	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Re-direct,
L1	yes.
L2	THE CHAIRPERSON: Yes. One second.
L3	MS MAILLET: The re-examination, I
L4	don't anticipate being much more than an hour.
L5	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Okay. In
L6	that case we'd most likely be done with the witnesses
L7	tomorrow.
L8	THE CHAIRPERSON: With this witness.
L9	Okay.
20	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: There will be
21	no respondent witnesses called.
22	THE CHAIRPERSON: There will be no
23	respondent witnesses.
24	Then, of course, I can't imagine I
25	was turning my evidence to saving whether there is

1	going to be rebuttal evidence, but there is no evidence
2	to rebut because they won't be leading any evidence.
3	MR. RICHARDSON: The only request we
4	have, and we'll be totally flexible on how we can
5	accommodate this, is we don't really care when
6	Mr. Warman and Ms Monette want to do their closing, but
7	we actually wouldn't mind requesting the time to get
8	the transcripts in and prepare, you know, since we're
9	not testifying, prepare the best one we possibly can.
10	THE CHAIRPERSON: I understand.
11	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: We still have
12	to do some research on how we're going to be, I guess,
13	structuring our closing statements.
14	And for that what we have is, we just
15	put a proposal that maybe we come down to Ottawa if we
16	do it at a later date, come down to Ottawa
17	THE CHAIRPERSON: I appreciate your
18	offer.
19	My concern with that is that, if I
20	understood your suggestion there, it would be a one day
21	scenario and it seems, from my experience, unlikely
22	that we would be able to I mean, if you're going to
23	drive, it's five hours to get to Ottawa, if we're
24	fortunate the arguments finish between 9:00 and 5:00 -
25	I don't know if that's I mean, there is four of you,

1	there will be four of you making legal submissions.
2	MR. RICHARDSON: But, would it be
3	possible for their side to do their closing this week
4	THE CHAIRPERSON: I will put that to
5	the Commission.
6	MR. RICHARDSON:and then Alex and
7	I could be done in one day.
8	MS MAILLET: No, I would prefer to
9	have the closings heard at the same time. I'm
10	uncomfortable with us doing ours now and then having
11	theirs two weeks from now.
12	THE CHAIRPERSON: Yes. It's logical.
13	You know what, in a perfect world, I
14	always prefer to have the parties' counsel, or the
15	parties themselves, make their legal submissions after
16	they have had the opportunity to prepare themselves.
17	And, possible, if it's possible - and
18	this applies to all sides - if some document could be
19	prepared, called it an outline or a table of contents
20	or all your submissions, if you wish, in writing.
21	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Okay.
22	THE CHAIRPERSON: Hand it up to the
23	Tribunal so that I can follow you.
24	I really find that it helps you
25	organize your thoughts - and I'm now speaking to

1	everyone, those on the phone and those that are here in
2	the room with me - as well as allowing me to follow
3	better.
4	MR. VAHE KULBASHIAN: Exactly. This
5	is what I'm trying to do.
6	THE CHAIRPERSON: No, I think I would
7	appreciate that too.
8	MR. VAHE KULBASHIAN: Yes, we will
9	write it, you know, everything with the things, the
10	tabs, everything and we will hand you a copy so that,
11	you know, later on also you can follow our thing,
12	logic.
13	THE CHAIRPERSON: Thank you for that.
14	Yes, that makes a lot of sense.
15	Now, let me look at other options
16	then.
17	As I say, you could drive up, but I
18	just do not see us doing it one day. Can you envisage
19	the possibility of staying overnight?
20	The Tribunal could advise you of some
21	hotels that are of reasonable cost. Many of our people
22	who come from out of town stay in hotels that are like
23	hotel apartments, you know, where four or five people
24	can stay in one room and the price is, generally
25	speaking, the same.

1	MR. VAHE KULBASHIAN: I would say
2	that, you know, this is not the issue for the moment.
3	MR. RICHARDSON: Well, it is for me.
4	Money is definitely an issue. That would be a refusal
5	at all, I wouldn't be able to afford that.
6	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: We haven't
7	Mr. Richardson brought up an issue, like, actually the
8	proposal yesterday if it's possible to do it through
9	video conferencing maybe.
10	THE CHAIRPERSON: Well, I will
11	examine that but I am going to leave it perhaps to the
12	parties ultimately to get back to me on this.
13	One option of video conferencing -
14	and I am going to look at the people in the room here -
15	the Tribunal, of course, is prepared to go anywhere the
16	case has to go, and I don't know if the Commission is
17	in the same position.
18	I'm mindful Mr. Warman, though, is
19	working with his own means.
20	Would you be opposed, Mr. Warman, if
21	we were to set ourselves up in a facility - this is
22	just for legal argument, no examination - in a facility
23	where everyone else, including Ms. Maillet, would be in
24	the same facility and you would be in our offices in
25	Ottawa at our video conferencing facility our

1	conference room at the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal?
2	MR. WARMAN: Sorry, is the suggestion
3	that everyone else would decamp to Toronto or Oakville?
4	THE CHAIRPERSON: Well, everyone else
5	would be this Tribunal and, I'm thinking Commission
6	counsel, they already - the other respondents - reside
7	in the area.
8	MR. WARMAN: Right.
9	THE CHAIRPERSON: So, but the concern
10	is for you in terms of the expenses that you would have
11	to lay out.
12	It's argument. I have used video
13	conferencing facilities, I have used them for evidence.
14	I am very satisfied with the usage of video conference
15	facilities, in fact, sometimes I find it easier on
16	occasion.
17	I mean, some places that we conduct
18	hearings, it is more difficult to hear and see the
19	witness than it is when using the video conference
20	facility where it takes up the entire screen of a large
21	television.
22	So, it would be one person speaking
23	at a time and we all have all the exhibits in our
24	possession, it's not one of those situations where we
25	can't sort of get an exhibit to the other end.

1	So, if cost is a factor for you,
2	Mr. Warman, that can be accommodated from the Tribunal.
3	I would prepared to recommend to the Tribunal that we
4	take up the cost of the video conferencing facility.
5	We have the equipment at the Tribunal.
6	So, I don't know. That's an option I
7	put to you. It may be an accommodation, I know we have
8	all been accommodating left and right here on all
9	sides, but it might be a simple solution in terms of
10	and you wouldn't have to displace yourself at all
11	through your work even, it would be just the hours that
12	we would need to do the hearing.
13	MR. WARMAN: Response now?
14	THE CHAIRPERSON: Response.
15	MR. WARMAN: Okay. I guess, well, my
16	preferences in order would be the first, that the
17	hearings take place be completed in Ottawa for the
18	closing arguments, and I think that's based on a number
19	of points.
20	The first one being, of course, that
21	we've now spent two and a half, almost three weeks here
22	in Oakville and, you know, the clearly considerable
23	expense that that has entailed on my part, including
24	disruption of my work life and personal life as well.
25	If that were not the case and the

1	Tribunal did choose to hold the hearings in Oakville,
2	then I would attend in person.
3	THE CHAIRPERSON: You would?
4	MR. WARMAN: Yes, yes.
5	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: This is
6	Mr. Kulbashian.
7	Well, basically, having a video
8	conferencing option would give you the option would
9	give Mr. Warman the option of being in Ottawa,
10	obviously, and we could both me and my co-respondent
11	could either be in Hamilton or Toronto in order, so
12	that we wouldn't have any displacement.
13	THE CHAIRPERSON: I think in order to
14	simplify things, I would probably seek to find one
15	place here. See, I'm trying to there is some
16	inconvenience in the video conferencing, so at the
17	minimum I would try to gather as many people who are
18	within one geographic region in one room with the video
19	conference machine and try to minimize the number of
20	people who are at a distance.
21	So, I don't think I would do a
22	Hamilton, Toronto, Ottawa thing. I think it would be
23	one location, maybe there is one out here in the middle
24	areas of Mississauga or Oakville.

25

MR. RICHARDSON: I would be willing

1	to come to Toronto, like.
2	THE CHAIRPERSON: That's what I'm
3	saying. I mean, we know the drive is not enormous,
4	Mr. Richardson, I mean, it is a couple of hours in
5	early morning.
6	MR. RICHARDSON: It's a three and a
7	half hour drive home.
8	THE CHAIRPERSON: Oh, because of
9	traffic?
10	MR. RICHARDSON: Oh yeah, it's a
11	three and a half our drive home every night.
12	THE CHAIRPERSON: Anyway
13	MR. RICHARDSON: It's not easy.
14	THE CHAIRPERSON: But it is my
15	preference.
16	MR. RICHARDSON: I mean, I'd take the
17	bus into Toronto if that was the easiest and that's
18	where we needed to be.
19	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: The GO Train.
20	THE CHAIRPERSON: The GO Train.
21	MR. RICHARDSON: Whatever.
22	THE CHAIRPERSON: One suggestion is
23	being made the Torontonians head opposite the traffic
24	towards Hamilton to do the next one.
25	Anyway that is one. We can continue

1 to examine the option.

You know, it would probably be easier for all concerned in terms of setting down dates as well to do it in Ottawa. I mean, if it were possible for everyone to come -- for the Torontonians to come to Ottawa for -- I can't see it being more than two days.

If we, for instance, to schedule a Monday and Tuesday, all right. You know, if you were to drive up either early morning Monday or possibly Sunday night and, as I say, we would make those arrangements. We're not talking about huge amounts of money for the hotels, so, it's about \$130 a night maybe at one of these places we're talking about. I've stayed many times at these hotels in Ottawa in the past.

MR. RICHARDSON: Well, my problem is is that I live on a fixed income, I'm on disability and, like, there's just no extra money, even if I could find the money to stay up there for the night I wouldn't have any money to eat or anything. And then, there's always the chance that if I get sick - which happens quite frequently - you know, I'd need to be, you know, near my doctors and stuff. I wouldn't be too comfortable leaving too far away with no money, I think is the issue with me.

1	THE CHAIRPERSON: How about
2	Mr. Kulbashian? Maybe we would do the reverse
3	situation of what we have spoken about?
4	What if you, Misters Kulbashian, were
5	to come up as you have suggested and conduct the
6	hearing in Ottawa and just do a video hook-up for
7	Mr. Richardson in Hamilton?
8	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: That would be
9	an option, but if we can arrange that situation, then
10	why don't we like, the respondents stay in one
11	location for a video conference and the complainant and
12	Ms Maillet would be at another location, so I mean, if
13	we already have a video conferencing link going then me
14	and James could be me and Mr. Richardson could be in
15	the same location, that way we don't have to have three
16	locations, if we if we were to have video
17	conferencing going we might as well just, you know,
18	keep people in their general areas, if that's the case.
19	THE CHAIRPERSON: All right. Well,
20	hmm
21	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Hello?
22	THE CHAIRPERSON: Yes, I'm just
23	thinking.
24	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Oh sorry.
25	I'm on a cell phone, so I'm not sure, so

1	THE CHAIRPERSON: I don't know
2	whether we have to make this decision right now,
3	whether everyone would like to consider options.
4	Mr. Warman, I hear you and I don't
5	want you to displace yourself to come down from Ottawa.
6	MR. WARMAN: I understand.
7	THE CHAIRPERSON: But you want to be
8	at the hearing.
9	MR. WARMAN: Yes.
10	THE CHAIRPERSON: Because I don't
11	know, what am I supposed to base it on?
12	I mean, I have Mr. Richardson tell me
13	he is on financial aid and so on, so it's difficult for
14	him, it's difficult for you.
15	Is it just to balance the
16	inconvenience that I should require the respondents to
17	come to Ottawa as opposed to looking for something with
18	a video facility? I mean, it would not be an
19	inconvenience if we use video facilities.
20	MR. WARMAN: If all parties are
21	appearing by video conference, then obviously I'm
22	comfortable with appearing by video conference.
23	THE CHAIRPERSON: It's the imbalance,
24	then, that you're concerned with
25	MR. WARMAN: Yes.

1	THE CHAIRPERSON:in terms of
2	how
3	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: This is
4	Mr. Kulbashian. Actually, my issue is the fact that my
5	son, so, if I sleep over in Ottawa then I pretty much
6	can't be away from him overnight, you know, for two
7	days because then we have a problem with having him
8	picked up, taken care of and et cetera, so
9	THE CHAIRPERSON: And I'm sure
10	everyone has children
11	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: That creates
12	a problem for me too.
13	THE CHAIRPERSON: Everyone here has
14	children that need to be taken care of, I'm sure.
15	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Yeah,
16	MR. VAHE KULBASHIAN: I'm sorry, now,
17	I don't understand regarding this closing thing,
18	argument.
19	THE CHAIRPERSON: Yes?
20	MR. VAHE KULBASHIAN: Is it going
21	just to be a reading or it's going to be a discussion
22	again?
23	THE CHAIRPERSON: Inevitably there's
24	a discussion, Mr. Kulbashian.
25	MR. VAHE KULBASHIAN: Yes.

1	THE CHAIRPERSON: There always is
2	some discussion. I ask questions to further understand
3	submissions.
4	The other side has to be able to,
5	well, reply, although that's done in an orderly
6	fashion. One person each person or each party has
7	his turn.
8	MR. VAHE KULBASHIAN: I understand.
9	THE CHAIRPERSON: So, it's just back
10	and forth basically, not interjecting, but I interject.
11	MR. VAHE KULBASHIAN: I understand.
12	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Okay. In
13	that case, Mr. Chair, just a question, is there
14	anywhere I could go to get, I guess, an example or an
15	idea of how it's done, because that would obviously be
16	different than how it's done in criminal courts and,
17	so
18	THE CHAIRPERSON: Not entirely
19	different than how it would be done in criminal courts.
20	But let me ask, do we have any case
21	scheduled to take place in the Toronto area in the next
22	while?
23	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Hello?
24	THE CHAIRPERSON: Mr. Kulbashian, I'm
25	just asking Mr. Levac if there are any cases in the

1	Toronto area.
2	No. But it's like any civil case,
3	there is no distinction, Mr. Kulbashian. The lawyers
4	get up, they submit their arguments, it's in the way
5	that I've been telling you all along in terms of how
6	you organize the evidence that's been presented and
7	make a logical conclusion for each point that you want
8	to make.
9	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Sorry.
10	THE CHAIRPERSON: And you should be
11	referring to the Statute and to the jurisprudence, the
12	other decisions from the Tribunal and courts that are
13	pertinent to the case.
14	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Okay. And,
15	however, the discussion would be just when you,
16	Mr. Chair, interject and then there would be a question
17	posed
18	THE CHAIRPERSON: Yes.
19	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN:which we
20	would be, like, to respond. Okay, I understand.
21	THE CHAIRPERSON: Not too dissimilar
22	than what we've doing until now. Do you know how
23	sometimes I will ask you questions if I don't
24	understand the point you're trying to make or so on,
25	similar to that.

1	If you make a submission and I
2	perhaps see an issue with what you've said, I'll bring
3	it up with you at that moment so that we can have a
4	sort of debate.
5	I will recommend something to you. I
б	will recommend you watch on CPAC - I don't know if it's
7	happening right now - like the Supreme Court legal
8	submissions that are made to the Supreme Court.
9	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Okay.
10	THE CHAIRPERSON: They're shown on
11	television on CPAC on Saturdays.
12	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: All right.
13	THE CHAIRPERSON: Usually. I don't
14	know if it's happening this week or the following week
15	It's not that different. I mean, we deal with
16	evidence, which the Supreme Court, they tend to just
17	deal with the legal issues.
18	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Okay.
19	THE CHAIRPERSON: But it's not that
20	much different. You will see how the judges will pose
21	questions from time to time.
22	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: All right.
23	THE CHAIRPERSON: And those are the
24	types of questions. That's a good recommendation.
25	Now, have there been any discussions

1	amongst you? Nothing? No.
2	So, I think what I am going to do is
3	then you were going to make, Mr. Warman, a specific
4	request in writing?
5	MR. WARMAN: No, that was pending
6	these discussions. Now, that we're having these
7	discussions now then I won't, unless you move to have
8	all parties submit written submissions, then
9	THE CHAIRPERSON: Okay, I understand
10	your position.
11	It's just I'm hesitant at this time
12	to just set down dates and I really am in a difficult
13	position to set down dates at this time.
14	I have received sort of a guideline,
15	if you will, from the Registrar that I shouldn't be
16	setting down dates myself because they may conflict
17	with other dates of which I'm not aware that they've
18	set aside for me or for the Tribunal. So, we may have
19	to do this through Mr. Levac later on.
20	And maybe as a consequence of the
21	dates, because if I'm not very available and it's
22	difficult for me to displace myself, maybe I'll look
23	into this video conferencing from Ottawa, where I would
24	stay in Ottawa with the Ottawa participants and have
25	the other parties in Toronto, or vice versa. I don't

1	know.
2	I just want to be certain of this,
3	Mr. Warman. There is no way that you would allow us to
4	proceed without you being I mean, you won't be there
5	but the Commission would be there.
6	MR. WARMAN: No, I understand that.
7	It's that I have some desire to inconvenience anything,
8	it's just that as the complainant I wish to be present.
9	So, if the cost is to come and attend, then
10	THE CHAIRPERSON: For me, you being
11	at the other end of a TV camera, is being present.
12	MR. WARMAN: I understand.
13	THE CHAIRPERSON: And I think from
14	your perspective it would be the same I don't know
15	if you've ever participated in a video conference.
16	MR. WARMAN: I have.
17	THE CHAIRPERSON: So you're aware
18	then
19	MR. WARMAN: Yes.
20	THE CHAIRPERSON:of how live it
21	is. It's not as if you're out of the picture,
22	particularly since we're dealing with exhibits that
23	basically are in two volumes, it's not as if we'd be
24	looking at big texts.
25	What I'm going to do is the good old

1	Canadian thing and put it off for a while. Let me
2	think it through and see what's the best option. We'll
3	be in touch with you.
4	Anyway, we may even talk about
5	tomorrow again, if we have some time.
6	I guess that covers off all the
7	issues that we had outstanding, since it appears that
8	we will be finished with this witness and we know there
9	won't be any other witnesses to speak.
10	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Hello?
11	THE CHAIRPERSON: Yes.
12	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: The audio
13	isn't like quality one, I can barely hear what's being
14	said, it fades in and out, I think it's a speaker phone
15	if I'm not mistaken.
16	THE CHAIRPERSON: It is a speaker
17	phone, yes, and it's nothing special, it's just a
18	regular telephone.
19	So, what portions what was the
20	last thing you heard me say?
21	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: That you're
22	right after, like, exploring the issue further and ther
23	it just faded away.
24	THE CHAIRPERSON: Okay. I will

explore the issue further and we may even discuss it

25

1	tomorrow some more, after I've given it some thought,
2	and in fact what I will do is I will call the office as
3	well to get a more definite handle on what my
4	availabilities are.
5	Right now January does not look good
6	for me, I mean, I'm very busy in January and December
7	is the same.
8	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Mr. Chair, I
9	submit that we all go home and get all our dates
10	together and then deal with this issue maybe tomorrow.
11	THE CHAIRPERSON: I'll try. I will
12	try and communicate with my office and see if I can get
13	better details on that.
14	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Yeah, because
15	on my cell phone, the battery either heats up too fast
16	or it starts draining too fast as the conversation goes
17	along.
18	THE CHAIRPERSON: I was concerned
19	when you mentioned you were on a cell phone for that
20	reason.
21	Okay. So, since there's nothing
22	really more to discuss we'll discuss it tomorrow.
23	MR. VAHE KULBASHIAN: So at two
24	tomorrow; right?
25	THE CHAIRPERSON: Yes, tomorrow

1	what time, we said two o'clock; right?
2	MR. VAHE KULBASHIAN: At two o'clock.
3	And then, after tomorrow, then everyone is free until
4	we decide, it is going to be the last day tomorrow
5	then?
6	THE CHAIRPERSON: Yeah, that would be
7	the last day tomorrow.
8	MR. VAHE KULBASHIAN: That's fine.
9	THE CHAIRPERSON: Okay.
10	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Thank you,
11	Mr. Chair.
12	THE CHAIRPERSON: Thanks.
13	MR. VAHE KULBASHIAN: Thank you,
14	Mr. Chair.
15	THE CHAIRPERSON: Yes.
16	MR. RICHARDSON: Thank you.
17	THE CHAIRPERSON: See you all
18	tomorrow.
19	MR. VAHE KULBASHIAN: Bye-bye.
20	MR. ALEXAN KULBASHIAN: Okay,
21	good-bye.
22	Whereupon the teleconference concluded at 3:45 p.m.
